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HOT BIKE HOTLINE


In the interest of keeping ballconer riders honest and all the bikes in the right hands we present the Hot Bike Hotline.





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ERACE REPORTS

VICTOR VINCENTE OF AMERICA RESEDA TO THE SEA CHALLENGE MARCH 9, 1980

Down in Southern California the Cruiser scene has been mostly confined to the beach, and only recently have the down Southers taken to the hills. There was no lack of enthusiasm as some 35 of them showed up for the race. Northern Cal. supplied a dozen of the riders and these took a majority of the prizes including the first three women finishers.

The twelve mile course had three or four miles of pavement and at the beginning this favored the four cyclo-cross (skinny tire) bikes, but when the going got rough three of the lightweights folded up.

When the first streatch of pavement ended Gary Fisher took command on the rough surface of a washed out streambed. Riding his Tom Ritchey bike, he piled up a good lead and coasted to victory with a comfortable two minute margin.

Second was Ron Skarin, former national road champ, on his (boo) lightweight Teledryne Ron was in third place when he hit the last stretch of pavement, and his road bike enabled him to catch and pass third place rider Gordon Burns. Madeline Roese finished first in the Womens Category and nineteenth overall.

Hopefully future races in L.A. will not include so much pavement.


The Zero's Notch race pitted a variety of balloon tired bikes against fifteen miles of the roughest, rockiest roads in Marin. The mass start event had more descending then climbing, but as it turned out, the climbing made the difference.

The start at an elevation of 1050' saw the group brake up immediately on the first long climb to 1750'. Eventual winner Gordon Burns of Santa Rosa, quickly established a lead on the uphill, but relinquished it to Ken Fuetsch of Corte Madera on the following tricky descent to 4501. From this point the course climbed sharply for two miles and sharply for another four. Burns made up his deficit and put enough distance between himself and Fuetsch to hold Kenny off on the last two mile descent down the infamous Repack racecourse. The winning time was 1:17:10

Fuetsch finished 2:48 down on Burns, followed 1:40 later by Jerry Heidenriech. Joe Breeze' knowledge of the course enabled him to pass Allen Zulch just before the finish, knocking Allen out of the Expert Category prize list.

Novice Category winner Mike Castelli finished in 1:24:28. Other Novice places went to Erik Koski, second in 1:25:11, Joe Murray third in 1:26:03, Mark Slate, fourth in 1:26:1 and Ned Farnkopf, fifth in 1:28:18.

A special prize of fastest one speed went to Jim Groth of Carson City, Nevada, sixth Novice in 1:28:30. Prizes were furnished by: Mill Valley Cyclery, The Cove, Wheels Unlimite Village Peddler, Mountain Bikes, and Sunshine.



FISHER WINS CENTRAL COAST JUNE 7, 1980

Gary Fisher is proving himself to be unbeatable in long distance cross-country racing; his latest win in the Central Coast Clunker Classic in San Luis Obispo was by a decisive margin of ten minutes over James McLean of Santa Barbara.

Gary waited out the first few of the 25 miles on smooth and level surfaces. When the 14 mile 2500' climb began on rougher roads he took a convincing lead that was up to three miles on the next rider at the begining of the descent.

Gary finished the hairy descent on skinny trails and loose gravel with a ten minute lead. After McLean finished on his Pro Cruiser there was a long fifteen minute gap before Victor Vincente of America hove into sighton his custom Topanga! machine at 25:20. Joe Breeze on his own custom Breezer finished fourth at 27:45.


Denise Caramagno took the Women's prize on her Breeze bike.
